Behavior Guidance & Discipline Policy Statement

As a team member of_____, I understand that it is my responsibility to provide developmentally appropriate guidance for the benefit of the children. I am aware that:

- o Corporal punishment including spanking, shaking, and slapping shall not be used.
- o Name-calling, shouting, threating, ridiculing is not acceptable.
- Punishment which is humiliating or frighting, or which causes pain or discomfort to the child shall not be used.
- Punishment shall not be administered because of a child's illness, or progress or lack of progress in toilet training.
- There shall be no punishment or threat of punishment be associated with depriving of food or rest.
- No child shall be subject to verbal abuse, threats, or derogatory remarks about the child or the child's family.
- o Isolation of a child is not acceptable in the center.
- Reasonable accommodation shall be made, based on special need of children with disabilities. This accommodation shall be recorded in the child's file. Accommodation can be specific treatment prescribed by a professional or a parent, or a modification of equipment, or removal of physical barriers.
- Our program has a written policy on the discipline of children which provides for positive guidance with direction for resolving conflict and setting of well-defined limits. This disciplinary policy has been designed to help the children develop self-control, selfesteem, and respect for the right of others. The program helps teachers turn discipline issues and convey them into teachable moments. I read written policy and understand that all team members and parents receive this.
- Sending a child to the office is not acceptable

Positive guidance

Infant and toddlers:

- Meet babies' needs for love and care and build a trusting relationship with them.
 Build a foundation.
- 2. Prepare the play space thoughtfully and make it childproof.
- 3. Accept children's feelings and provide outlets for them.
- 4. Refocus toddlers' attention before inappropriate behavior occurs.
- 5. State directions clearly and simply.
- 6. Be calm and consistent.
- 7. Allow children time to adjust to transitions.

Preschool and after school:

- 1. Arrange classrooms that are comfortable, interesting and encourage children's self-direction.
- 2. Help children express their emotions verbally through different classroom activities.
- 3. Allow children to resolve their own conflicts first when possible.
- 4. Model and teach children strategies for solving interpersonal conflicts.
- 5. Set clear, consistent, fair limits for the classroom behavior.

I have been provided with a copy ofDiscipline Policy and understand that a breach of the policy may be just cause of immediate dismissal. I have also been provided with a copy ofBehavior Intervention Policy and am aware of my responsibility to use this policy to dimmish and handle behavior issues. I also understand that I am mandatory child abuse reporter according to Illinois state law.
